A Discussion about Wind

Some of you may notice that our main strip along Yonge Street between Finch and Sheppard can feel quite windy at times. Unfortunately, earlier in the development of our urban centre, there weren't policies around wind which means we have several tall buildings that stand flat against the sidewalk. The height and width of these buildings push wind downwards toward people on the sidewalk.

Last week I met with our community planner Guy Matthew and Urban Design Program Manager at the City of Toronto, Dawn Hamilton. We discussed the impact of wind on pedestrians in Willowdale, how buildings do wind studies in their application process and design elements that mitigate wind. Design elements such as awnings and buildings that have a podium with a tower that is set back further can help mitigate the impact of wind in our community. Trees can also play a role in decreasing the wind experienced by pedestrians.

There are two kinds of modelling that can be used for a wind study. The first uses computational modelling with consideration of surrounding building heights and built form. The second uses foam models with instruments that measure the wind impact. This information is helpful as we consider future public realm design with Transform Yonge where we should consider incorporating some free-standing awnings and more trees to help reduce the wind in our neighbourhood.

North York Community Council

There were several fence exemption requests in Willowdale. Many of them were deferred as residents will continue to work with staff towards an agreeable outcome. The two exemptions that were passed had the support of neighbours and did not present any safety issues. The other item that was passed for Willowdale was:

NY13.19 - Yonge Street and Kempford Boulevard - U-Turn Prohibition

We have received several complaints from residents who are concerned about people making U-turns at Yonge and Kempford endangering people trying to cross the road. Transportation staff suggested implementing a U-Turn prohibition both north and southbound at this intersection. This was passed at North York Community Council last week.

Lunch with the Chief of Police

I believe in the importance of building relationships towards better collaboration and communication. Last week I had my second annual lunch with the Chief. He brought one of his staff members and I brought Sara, my Chief of Staff. Chief Demkiw's team asked if I had an agenda for the luncheon and I said no because the purpose of the lunch is to get to know each other beyond the many formal interactions we have at board meetings.

During our meeting, we both agreed on the need for 32 Division to have a refresh of their aging building. Due to capital budget constraints, we discussed the potential of building a podium police station, which has been done in other municipalities. This is something we will discuss further. I also expressed my appreciation for the positive working relationship and support we have with 32 Division.
