Here are some of the key parts of this motion: • Police: Many people are concerned about the police budget; some want

- the city to pay the full amount requested by TPS, while others want the city to maintain the \$12.6 million reduction in what was requested. The motion recommends we work towards a multi-year hiring plan which will provide stability and predictability in staffing and funding. Cost Savings: The Budget Committee recommend that the Mayor request the City Manager and Chief Financial Officer to continue to work with
- management to find opportunities for further efficiencies and savings, with such savings being used to mitigate the 2025 property tax increase, this includes: • All employees being surveyed by their managers for ideas to save on
 - purchases, including uniforms, furniture, equipment; All employees being surveyed by their managers to identify savings in travel, overtime, and consulting fees; and
 - All employees are engaged in creating a culture that celebrates completing projects on-time and on / under-budget.
- Windrow Clearing: The continuation of the Winter Windrow Clearing Program in the areas of the city where the service is already provided;
- Funding for Refugees: The Budget Committee recommend that the Mayor continue to advocate to the Federal government on the reimbursement for the City's 2023 refugee housing costs and commitment
- for the City's 2024 refugee housing costs and those costs on an ongoing basis, all of which fall under the Federal government's responsibility for refugees and immigration. **Scarborough Budget Deputations** I spent Monday at Scarborough Civic Centre (which has a giant pond with koi

fish in their lobby) listening to deputations alongside fellow Budget Committee

members, Deputy Mayor McKelvie and Deputy Mayor Morley, along with Councillor Myers and Councillor Thompson. We listened to 52 deputants who each had 5 minutes to share with added time for questions from councillors. The overarching theme was the underinvestment

in infrastructure in Scarborough. They have long been promised a subway line

that is still under construction. With the recent closure of Scarborough RT Line 3, many residents have had to add 20-30 minutes longer to commute per day. There was a lot of frustration expressed about the inequity of investments made by the city that often favour downtown areas over the suburbs. It must be incredibly frustrating for all those who depended on Line 3 that now have to take a shuttle bus. Many deputants asked for more funding to advance a dedicated laneway to reduce the impact of Line 3 through faster travel. Even with further investment - such a project would likely not be completed until 2027. It is so frustrating that the city allowed this to happen! There was a lot of support for the tax increase and resulting bolstering of services including a freeze on TTC fares. One deputant, Susan Watson, impressed us with her knowledge of the impact of Bill 23 (Click Here to learn more about it) that reduced the amount of money developers contribute towards city infrastructure. According to Susan, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario says there will be a \$5.1 Billion shortfall

over 9 years for infrastructure building across Ontario. Growth no longer pays

for growth and now municipalities like Toronto have to find other ways to get things done. Many feel that as a result of Bill 23 we are subsidizing development including luxury condos to the tune of \$19K for one bedroom. Ultimately, the lack of investment in infrastructure will result in a greater cost to residents. Last year a Toronto staff report found: Bill 23 is estimated to result in a \$2.3 billion revenue loss to the City's growth funding tools over a 10-year period, including development charges, community benefit charges and parkland dedication. The complete financial impact to the City remains uncertain. Read More. We hope this part of Bill 23 can experience the same reversal as the policy on allowing development on the Green Belt. **North York Deputations** There were mixed levels of support for the tax increase with many deputants who support the increase, voicing the importance of investments being made towards climate change. Meeting with North York Central Library

This past week we met with the library to talk about how we can collaborate and strengthen engagement in our community. We also discussed how to connect vulnerable youth in our neighbourhood to their amazing youth hub that also provides healthy snacks! We are lucky to have such an amazing library in our neighbourhood. Meeting with 32 Division and Dixon Hall

Some community members have reached out about incidents that have happened near the warming centre. All staff, including the police are careful not to draw a direct connection although there was mention of a spike of incidents in the area. When the warming centre is open, there is a 24/7 community safety team that is mostly outdoors patrolling the area. This safety team is trained in de-escalation and also knows how to connect people to services. The police and safety team talked about sharing information with each other towards better collaboration. Some residents wonder, what happens when the temperature is above -5°C and the warming centre closes? We were told that Dixon Hall does not immediately kick everyone out. Instead, they wind down according to how many clients they are able to refer to other more permanent shelter spaces. North York Community Council - 72 Church Ave.

Several Willowdalers attended our meeting this past week to make deputations

against a new development that has been proposed for 72 Church Avenue. This development has been in the works for over a decade and has gone through several iterations from senior's home to now rental units and from 22 units to now 14. Community members are concerned about impact on traffic, especially because it is across the street from McKee Public School where a lot of car and student activity happens on weekdays. They are concerned about the impact on the building infrastructure of the surrounding stacked townhomes, and precedent set for the surrounding single detached homes. This project has been approved by our planning division which means if we turn it down, we will have to hire consultants to argue against the plan. Because the previous consultation was based on a previous version of the application, I deferred this item to the next North York Community Council so we can organize a community meeting with the applicant to discuss their concerns. I hope it can be a constructive conversation.

3 Swift Drive (Ward 16)

There was a large group of deputants who are facing demo-viction. They are primarily seniors paying low rents who now face eviction while the development is built. Due to the proximity to a new transit station, many of these buildings will likely be converted in this way. This is very stressful for the tenants who worry about the stress of moving, finding somewhere affordable to wait out the construction and the unknown future. Although they have been promised rental replacement, moving cost support and rent gap support, change is never easy especially when it has to do with your home. Although it is unlikely we can cancel this project, I asked the city to ask the developer to replace at least one parking spot per household that has parking, as currently that is not being offered. Many seniors rely on driving to get to their appointments - and restoring access to parking, which they could never afford at market rates, will be important for maintaining consistency in lifestyle over the transition. I hope the developer will consider meeting this request.






The City acknowledges the recent challenges faced by clients due to confusion

surrounding the address of our warming center. The amalgamation of the City of Toronto led to some street names being duplicated among the original six municipalities, leading to misunderstandings.

Specifically, the Warming Centre formerly known as 15 Olive Ave encountered issues as another property with the same address existed in downtown Toronto. Despite the City's efforts to discourage visits to the incorrect 15 Olive Ave, individuals consistently arrived at the wrong location, causing stress for both the resident of the downtown address and the individuals seeking assistance.

To address this issue, Toronto Shelter and Support Services (TSSS) has initiated the process of assigning a new dedicated address to the warming center: 12 Holmes Ave, North York, ON M2N 4L8. This change, necessitated by the confirmation of two legally assigned municipal addresses for the property, is expected to significantly reduce confusion. TSSS is confident that this adjustment will facilitate better access for vulnerable individuals to the correct

address, ensuring consistent access to safe indoor spaces.



HARLANDALE CLOSURE TTC will be working to improve the infrastructure at Sheppard-Yonge Station this

year. Starting as early as January 26, a new duct bank will be constructed underneath Harlandale Avenue along the south curb lane. A duct bank is an underground reinforced concrete or metal container used for laying utility lines such as electrical. In the spring, TTC will also begin work to rehabilitate the pavement of the bus loop, requiring its temporary closure until late 2024. Click here to know additional details regarding the upcoming infrastructure improvements at Sheppard-Yonge Station.

What to expect during duct bank construction – January 26 to Fall 2024

To facilitate work safely, the TTC entrance on Harlandale Avenue will be

- temporarily closed starting as early as January 26. Sheppard-Yonge Station has eight other entrances to serve customers during this closure. To ensure a safe work zone and to maintain one-way, eastbound traffic on
- Harlandale Avenue, existing on-street Green P parking stalls will be temporarily restricted. No westbound access to Harlandale Avenue from Yonge Street.
- Work will involve excavating two shafts as seen below. The duct bank between
- the two shafts will be constructed underground using a trenchless method, requiring no further excavation. Work will typically take place daily from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- Access to the Green P parking lot on Harlandale Avenue will be unaffected.
