

attending the conference while attending overnight sessions of Toronto City Council. It

has been incredible to see the ingenuity and innovation of different municipalities which I look forward to summarizing and sharing when I return. In particular, it is amazing to see a city that has full support from higher levels of government towards building transit and social housing. The City of Toronto does not enjoy a similar level of investment and support from higher levels of government which is why our transit and many other parts of our infrastructure are suffering. We contribute 20% of Canada's GDP. A Strong Toronto

means a Strong Ontario and a Strong Canada. Our fiscal framework must be a key election issue for the upcoming Mayoral By-Election, Provincial and Federal Elections. We must elect people who understand the distinct needs of the City of Toronto and have a vision for a strong fiscal future for Toronto that does not require our mayor to beg for money from higher orders of government on an annual basis - which is currently a regular and necessary occurrence. Here are some of the motions I passed during overnight sessions from Taipei of Toronto City Council. A full summary of all motions that were passed and not passed can be found **here**.

Motion Passed: City Council request the City Manager to establish a program where Members of Council form delegations to meet with Members of Parliament and Members of Provincial Parliament to advocate for our budget issues. The lack of acknowledgement by the Provincial and Federal government of the many

contributions the City is making towards social supports for those experiencing homelessness as well as how we support newcomers and refugees - both of which are costs that should be coming from these other levels of government. Councillor Pasternak also points out that unlike any other municipality, the province has

downloaded the cost of maintenance of the DVP and Gardiner Expressway - whereas all other highways are paid for by the province. Click Here to read the bleak 10 year

<u>financial outlook</u> that was presented by Ernst and Young. I look forward to the opportunity to approach MPs and MPPs across the country about our challenges. Motion Passed: City Council request the Executive Director, Social Development, Finance and Administration and the General Manager, Shelter, **Support and Housing Administration, in consultation with Toronto Transit** Commission, to provide a summary of data collected relating to the unhoused on the Toronto Transit Commission over the past three years and report to City Council by the third quarter of 2023. Like many people across Toronto, it has been distressing to hear about the tragic

murder of 16 year old Gabriel Magalhaess by a stranger on a TTC platform. We passed several motions towards improving safety on the TTC. My motion is focused on looking at the data that is being collected so we can make better informed decisions. Once the report is shared, I will be looking at whether or not we are collecting sufficient data and examining how this data can be shared more widely on a regular basis. The Toronto Star published an article about the lack of data about this. Outside researchers feel we are not collecting enough data.

Motion Passed: City Council communicate to the Federal Electoral Boundaries Commission for Ontario that Toronto City Council strongly objects to the plan to

reduce the number of ridings in the City of Toronto as it will potentially reduce the representation of all Torontonians at all three levels of government, even though Toronto residents are already the most under-represented in Canada on a per capita basis. This is an amended version of a motion I passed at North York Community Council. The current Federal Electoral Districts Distribution iteration removes one of the 25 ridings in Toronto. As the fastest growing city in North America, we should not be losing one seat at the table at the Federal level which could eventually impact our Provincial and Municipal ridings/wards. Given the gap in understanding by higher

levels of government towards our current fiscal framework, it is clear we need more not less representation. Motion Passed (unanimously): City Council request the General Manager, **Economic Development and Culture, in consultation with the local Councillor's** office, to engage with community organizations in Willowdale to explore designating Yonge Street, between Steeles Avenue and Drewry Avenue, as a Cultural District in recognition of the area's vibrant Iranian culture, following City Council's consideration of objectives and criteria for the Cultural Districts

The Yonge Corridor in the northern part of Willowdale has long been known as a






