Park Parties are a Great Pathway to Democracy! We are grateful for all the community members who joined us for the Grand

Participating in consultations that shape the future of our community is part of participating in democracy. It isn't always easy to get people to come out for a "consultation meeting." However, consultation hosted alongside a park party is the best way to get people out. If only all our participation in democracy could be this fun!

A small win at Toronto Police Services Board

One of the hardest things about working as a City Councillor is the change we are able to make is often slow and incremental. My team and I are often frustrated along with constituents at the pace of getting things done. Yet, the longer I sit in this seat, the more I understand the difficulties of moving within a large organization with many staffing shortages and liability considerations. That being said, yesterday I experienced perhaps one of my most meaningful incremental wins. A few months ago I moved a motion at Toronto Police Services Board that officers conducting a search warrant would give consideration to children and vulnerable adults who might be inhabiting the space. Yesterday an update was given that checking in on children and vulnerable adults would now be included in the checklist officers are given when executing a search warrant and that a list of resources that includes these demographics would be provided for support related to the aftermath of having your home searched.

The seed for this motion was planted many years ago when I ran a basketball drop in for youth from under resourced communities. We held a special event where youth played basketball with officers and shared dinner together. During that dinner, we had some honest conversations and one young person shared the trauma they carried from a search warrant executed on a sibling and the resulting fear of police officers. When search warrant procedures were presented at the board meeting I noticed that while instructions were given for encountering residents in a state of undress, there were no specific instructions on how to support children.

officers would take a moment during a search and address children in the space who may feel scared or traumatized. I am grateful for the opportunity to make this small but meaningful change in how search warrants are executed in Toronto. <u>Click Here</u> to view the update presentation.

Burnside moved an amendment requiring further community consultation as well as matching parking provision with new tenants. Because of the many deputants, the meeting ran longer than expected and

different councillors had to jump on and off the meeting, making it difficult for us to maintain quorum. It was a bit of a circus for me as a first-time chair of the meeting! We ended up deferring a few items to the next meeting because of me through the meeting. Here are a few of the Willowdale items:

I moved that the item be forwarded to City Council without recommendation. The

reason for this is because I believe to build a vibrant community, we need commercial and amenity space on the ground floor. It also increases safety to have more pedestrians in the area. This development is across the street from the only park in the Yonge North York Secondary Plan. In the weeks before council, I will be advocating for minimum gross floor area for commercial space. Developers get more money from selling residential and they are afraid of vacant commercial properties. However, we can see, there are many successful areas of commercial space that are on side streets off of Yonge south of Finch including Northtown Way and Spring Garden Blvd. I am advocating for a

walkable and vibrant future for the northern part of our ward. NY8.14-17 - 3358-3362 Bayview Avenue - The houses are dilapidated and awaiting development. Usually demolitions are only granted when there is a building permit. In this case, the developer believes it will be 4 more years before they get to building permit stage. At a time of a housing crisis we should be discouraging developers from allowing houses to become unlivable. Many landowners would rather not deal with having tenants due to the complexity of eviction processes. Furthermore, once demolished, we also cease to collect

vacant home tax. I originally moved to stop these demolitions. However, the will

of my fellow councillors was to allow it due to the state of the houses and

because a plan for development was in place. Unfortunately, you cannot win every issue you stand up for.

Major Streets Study

In an effort to add more density, the city is looking at allowing for mid rise apartments and townhouses along major arteries. This would impact roads like Sheppard, Steeles, Bayview, Finch and Bathurst. I did notice some developers came out for the consultation - likely planning for future land assemblies and opportunities.



PLANNING COMMUNITY CONSULTATION ONLINE EVENT


Join us in an online community consultation to discuss 10-18 Abitibi and an information session about 33-43 Centre Ave. on Oct 23 from 6:30 pm to 8:30

pm. The application for 10-18 Abitibi Avenue proposes the development of a 50-

storey (160.4 metres) mixed use building, which would include 534 dwelling units and 186.2 square metres of retail/commercial gross floor area at-grade. The application also proposes 97 vehicle parking spaces within three levels of underground parking, as well as 412 bicycle parking spaces.

We will also discuss about the development application at 33-43 Centre Avenue. The application was appealed to the Ontario Land Tribunal ("OLT") and will be considered for approval by the OLT. The application proposes four blocks of 4storey (13.4 metres) buildings. Two of the proposed buildings would be back-toback stacked townhouses and two would be low-rise apartments. A total of 146 dwelling units are proposed as well as 143 vehicle parking spaces on one level of underground parking, as well as 112 bicycle parking spaces.



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


