The Impact of Terrorism and War on Willowdale It has been a heavy week. In the aftermath of the shocking attack by Hamas

terrorists on civilians in Israel, many neighbours who are grieving, scared, and angry have been in touch. I proudly stood with my fellow councillors and our

much longer. As we have done far too often in recent years, when members of the Willowdale community are in pain, we stand together. We offer a shoulder for our neighbours to lean on, and ask how we can help.

This is a difficult time as we face graphic images of war that are traumatizing. Images of human suffering pierce our hearts. We must acknowledge the pain of community members who are grieving the deaths or kidnappings of loved ones. What do we do with our pain? Here are some things that helped me journey with community members as the war in Ukraine unfolded:

- 1. Take mental health breaks from social media. It can be so easy for us to find ourselves "doomscrolling" as we watch war unfold in unprecedented 2. Check in on friends, family and community members who are personally
- connected to the war. A short email or text message that says, "how are you today? I just want to check in with you" can take only two seconds but be very meaningful. 3. Pray. I believe in the power of prayer, especially in the face of challenges
- over which we have no control.

I know that many forms of bigotry are on the rise in Canada, including

antisemitism and Islamophobia, and recognize that when violence escalates in the Middle East, expressions of such bigotry become more commonplace in Toronto. I have been in close contact with 32 Division and Toronto Police Services, whose officers are maintaining a heightened presence around mosques, synagogues and other locations that are significant for members of our Jewish and Muslim communities to deter hate crimes. Earlier this week our Chief of Police met with leaders from Jewish and Palestinian communities to discuss the Toronto Police Service's (TPS) role as law enforcement, public safety in our city, and how TPS can help our residents over the coming days and weeks. When we see intense suffering, it is only natural for us to feel rage at injustice

Canada, we can also find compassion, healing and hope as we stand together in our shared humanity. Let us not dehumanize one another. Our tendency in such intense pain is to see an 'us' and a 'them.' To find a path forward there must be a journey towards a shared 'we.' This will not be automatic, nor will it be easy. The generational trauma that has been experienced cannot easily be healed. But healing is our only path to peace. Many in our midst carry deep wounds and so, let us be gentle with each other and with ourselves. In challenging moments, let's try to take a deep breath and give space to one another. We cannot see the burdens and wounds others are

EC6.6 Transitioning the Vehicle-for-Hire Industry to Net Zero Emissions by 2030 This turned out to be a controversial item that began as a subsidy to incentivize conversion of Vehicles for Hire (Uber, Taxis, Limos) to EV towards meeting Toronto's Net Zero goals. It turned into intense debate around capping the total number of Rideshare drivers allowed in Toronto starting from yesterday. Mayor Chow shared about meeting an Uber driver who only made \$7/hr and that capping the number of drivers would increase the chances for drivers to earn higher wages with less competition. While I agree that the Rideshare system should provide drivers with dignified wages, this motion arrived as an

amendment without any supporting data or plan for execution. Here are my concerns: I've known some people who have turned to Rideshare driving in a moment of crisis or transition. It is one of the easiest jobs to get, without

- requiring an interview. If people are reluctant to let go of their now valuable licenses, this pathway that has helped a few people that I know could become inaccessible. Unintended consequences of commoditizing rideshare licenses. Once a
 - cap is in place, people might hold on to their licenses or find ways to monetize them. • This sudden cap would unfairly benefit Uber which has the lion's share of
 - the market while limiting the growth of any competitors. Other councillors raised concerns that this motion could result in a lawsuit.

The city solicitor agreed with this risk assessment. When I ran for city council, I promised that I would make data-based decisions. I could not support a sweeping decision like this which did not have any research

or plan attached to it. I was one of 7 councillors who voted against the motion.

The motion to cap passed and rumblings have already been heard about a potential lawsuit from Uber.
